PCC Music Program

The PCC music program is housed in the Center for the Arts, a state-of-theart facility, at West Campus. The program provides extensive experience and training in all aspects of classical and popular music including classes in theory, history, piano, guitar, studio instruction, music industry and electronic music, consistent with the first two years of a bachelor's degree in music. Students can earn an Associate of Fine Arts degree with a concentration in music that can transfer to a bachelor's degree in music performance, history, theory and education. Facilities include a state-of-the-art MIDI laboratory and electronic piano laboratory, practice rooms, large ensemble rehearsal rooms, the 75 plus-seat Recital Hall and the 425-seat Proscenium Theatre. Major performing ensembles include Wind Ensemble, Orchestra, Jazz Ensemble, Chorale, College Singers and Opera/Musical Theatre. The PCC music program has a reputation for quality instruction and caring instructors.

Mark Nelson has been a solo recitalist at several regional, national and international conferences. In the greater Tucson area he has performed tuba solos with the Sonoran Winds, Arizona Symphonic Winds, the Southern Arizona Symphony Orchestra and the Catalina Chamber orchestra. Other venues have included solo engagements with the Vermont Symphony Orchestra, the Minneapolis Pops Orchestra and the Las Vegas Brass Band. He has presented recitals and master classes in Canada, England, Japan and Australia, and recorded with Grammy-nominated

Symphonia, America's only professional large tuba/euphonium ensemble. Nelson has premiered nearly 30 new works for tuba and has numerous tuba/euphonium ensemble arrangements, articles, a book and over two hundred fifty music reviews published. His two CD recordings, "New England Reveries" and "Aboriginal Voices," have been internationally acclaimed. On the editorial staff of International Tuba Euphonium Association Journal since 1985, he currently serves as editor of new materials. He is also one of the principal editors of the Tuba Source Book published by Indiana University Press and now in its second edition. In Arizona, Dr. Nelson served three consecutive terms as vice president for professional development for the Arizona Music Educators Association. He was also the founder and music director for six years of the Northwest Intergenerational Community Orchestra in Oro Valley. Previous appointments include director of orchestras at Desert Mountain High School in Scottsdale AZ, professor of music (tenured) at Millikin University in Illinois and associate professor of music (tenured) at the University of Vermont. Nelson holds a B.A. magna cum laude from Point Loma Nazarene University; the Licentiate Performer's Diploma from Trinity College of Music, London; the M.M. and D.M.A. degrees from Arizona State University; and the M.Ed. in education administration from the University of Vermont. Dr. Nelson is currently chair of performing arts and director of bands at Pima Community College where he teaches courses in electronic music and music fundamentals
