PCC Music Program

The PCC Music Program is housed in the Center for the Arts, a state-of-theart facility, at West Campus. The program provides extensive experience and training in all aspects of classical and popular music including classes in theory, history, piano, guitar, studio instruction, music industry and electronic music consistent with the first two years of a bachelor's degree in music. Students can earn an Associate of Fine Arts degree with a concentration in music that can transfer to a bachelor's degree in music performance, history, theory and education. Facilities include a state-of-the-art MIDI laboratory, an electronic piano laboratory, practice rooms, large ensemble rehearsal rooms, the 75 plus-seat Recital Hall and the 425-seat Proscenium Theatre. Major performing ensembles include Wind Ensemble, Orchestra, Jazz Ensemble, Chorale, College Singers and OperaPima. The PCC Music Program has a reputation for quality instruction and caring instructors.

Mark Nelson has been conducting ensembles for over twenty-five years in a career spanning teaching and conducting appointments at the k-12, college/ university, and community levels. For many years, he was the conductor of the Vermont Wind Ensemble associated with the University of Vermont. He also conducted the Millikin University Concert Band during his tenure at that university and most recently in Arizona, spent two years at Desert Mountain High School as the director of orchestras and the last eight years conducting the PCC Wind Ensemble. He has also been invited to conduct many high school honor bands

in several states, most recently as the South Central High School Honor Band conductor for the Tucson region in February, 2008. He also serves as the first music director for the Northwest Intergenerational Community Orchestra in Oro Valley that combines school-aged musicians with retired musicians in one community orchestra. Keenly interested in music education, Nelson is the elected vice-president for professional development for the Arizona Music Educators Association.

Nelson holds the Bachelor of Arts degree from Point Loma Nazarene University, magna cum laude; the Licentiate Performer's Diploma from Trinity College of Music, London; the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from Arizona State University; and the Master of Education degree in Education Administration from the University of Vermont. Nelson is currently chair of performing arts and director of bands at Pima Community College where he also teaches courses in electronic music, music fundamentals, and music appreciation. Previous academic appointments include professor of music (tenured) and chair of academic studies at Millikin University in Decatur, Illinois and associate professor of music and director of bands at the University of Vermont (tenured) where he was principal tuba of the Vermont Symphony Orchestra and a member of the Vermont Town Brass and Vermont Brass Quintet.



Jay C. Rees is an experienced music educator with a varied background as a conductor, composer, arranger, and performer. Concert, jazz, and athletic bands across the country perform his original compositions and arrangements. He is published with Warner Bros./C.P.P. Belwin and Musicexpresso.com and his work is commissioned annually by major universities and high schools. Rees conducts the UA Wind Symphony and teaches undergraduate music education courses. He also travels as a clinician, guest speaker and adjudicator for band programs nationwide.

Under his inspired direction, The University of Arizona's marching and pep bands have attained a national reputation with Rees's contemporary arrangements and innovative drill design. Rees is an accomplished musician in jazz performance, having appeared throughout U.S., Canada and Japan. He toured with the international recording act The Lettermen as bassist and music director and is featured on their 1991 album release Now and Then. He currently collaborates with the UA jazz faculty and performs at UA's annual AZ Jazz festival. He is listed in Who's Who In America for the 21st Century as well as Who's Who Among America's Teachers. A native of Detroit, Rees lived in Miami and Los Angeles before making his home in Tucson with his wife and two sons.
