PCC Music Program

The PCC music program is housed in the Center for the Arts, a state-of-the-art facility, at West Campus. The program provides extensive experience and training in all aspects of classical and popular music including classes in theory, history, piano, guitar, studio instruction, music industry and electronic music, consistent with the first two years of a bachelor's degree in music. Students can earn an Associate of Fine Arts degree with a concentration in music that can transfer to a bachelor's degree in music performance, history, theory and education. Facilities include a state-of-the-art MIDI laboratory and electronic piano laboratory, practice rooms, large ensemble rehearsal rooms, the 75 plus-seat Recital Hall and the 425-seat Proscenium Theatre. Major performing ensembles include Wind Ensemble, Orchestra, Jazz Ensemble, Chorale and College Singers. The PCC music program has a reputation for quality instruction and caring instructors.

Edward Palmenberg is a beginning music education major studying under Mark Nelson at Pima Community College. He is a member of the PCC Wind Ensemble, the Tucson Concert Band and the University of Arizona marching band, The Pride of Arizona. He is an active member in Tau Beta Sigma, an honorary sorority that emphasizes service through music. His main instrument is tuba; however, he can play a variety of brass and percussion instruments. During his time at Tanque Verde High School, he was awarded the Quincy Jones Musicianship award for his outstanding compositions. He composes for solo and ensemble percussion and brass in his free time to take his mind off the stress of school.

Conductor biography:

Dr. Mark Nelson has been teaching for 35 years in a variety of institutions including elementary, middle and high schools in the Scottsdale Unified Schools, the University of Vermont, and Millikin University. He has been the Chair of Performing Arts and Director of Bands since 2000 at Pima Community College where he also teaches music fundamentals, electronic music, and conducts the pit orchestra for the annual musical. He also served as the Acting Dean of Arts and Humanities this past summer. He is an active performer in the metro Tucson area performing with the Tucson Symphony Orchestra, Southern Arizona Symphony Orchestra, Tucson Pops Orchestra, Arizona Symphonic Winds, Sonoran Winds, Big Band Express, and in a variety of productions and concerts on tuba, bass trombone, and string bass. His doctorate was granted by Arizona State University where he studied with tuba pedagogue Daniel Perantoni.
